## **Philadelphia International Airport Hosts 2015 Job Fair on May 12**

*Businesses and Government agencies seek to fill hundreds of positions*

**PHILADELPHIA** - Philadelphia International Airport (PHL) will host a 2015 job fair to fill immediate openings in businesses and government agencies with operations at the Airport. The job fair will be held Tuesday, May 12, from 10 A.M. to 3 P.M. at the Liacouras Center, 1776 N. Broad Street, on the campus of Temple University.

The Job Fair is being held in cooperation with the City of Philadelphia and Honorary co-Chairs Mayor Michael A. Nutter and Council President Darrell L. Clarke.

More than 30 businesses including airlines, restaurants, car rental companies, retailers, and government agencies including the City of Philadelphia Division of Aviation, and the Philadelphia Police and Fire Departments, are looking to fill openings. Businesses participating in the Job Fair are prepared to interview candidates on-the-spot as customer service representatives, sales associates, bartenders, servers, bookkeepers, massage therapists, cosmetologists, managers, cashiers, and more. Resumes are also being accepted.

Attendees will have the opportunity to meet with employment specialists who will review their resumes and offer interviewing tips. Workplace etiquette workshops will run throughout the day.

“The Airport supports more than 141,000 jobs in the region. Nearly 20,000 of those positions are right here at the Airport,” said Airport CEO Mark Gale. “It’s important that residents in the area have the first opportunity to fill open positions in businesses with operations at PHL. The job fair is one way that we help ensure that they do.”

Job seekers are encouraged to wear business attire and bring multiple copies of their resume.
